She has phoned and e-mailed carers to remind them of meetings and to keep in touch, she has cheered and supported them up in the Carers Club and Info Café, she has helped them with finding personal and respite care, she has facilitated CRB/DBS checks for volunteers when required, and so on. Meanwhile, she has worked full-time, developed her expertise and career in social care and recruitment, bought and refurbished her first house, and is now getting married. I think you will agree that she lives a pretty full life. However, it is now time for her to take a break from the project and we wish her the very best and all happiness. I am sure that we will not lose touch and that sometime in the future she will be able to help out once more.

In the meantime, Sam Forster and Mary Morley have offered to share the role of Carers Liaison. Mary has been Project Secretary since the start of the project and many of you will have received e-mails, newsletters, garden party invitations, events diaries, meeting dates,

agendas, minutes, etc. over the years — all those bits of administration which have to be done in the background. Although Sam has only been a volunteer with the project for the last few months she has found a special place in the Carers Club and info Café. In her "day job" she works with youngsters as a teaching assistant at the High School but she also has great rapport with those who are elderly and frail. As locally "born and bred", she understands and shares history with all those who come to Dove Cottage with laughter and caring. Especial congratulations to Sam on her marriage to Trevor.

Changing the subject, over the last "wee while" our treasurer, Roger Cockerton, and myself have been much concerned with preparing our "Trustees Report and Accounts". This is a critical document which tells the Charity Commission that we are worthy to operate as a charity and that our finances are in order. It's no small thing. As trustees we are legally liable for any irregularities and, especially, that we have met our commitments to family carers of those with dementia, and those they care for, within our community. I can report that our performance remains very good and we continue to grow and evolve in terms of the support that we offer. Financially, our expenditure was kept within our budget. However, our income was about £1,000 less than we had hoped for. This is not a major concern in the short term as we have been able to draw on our reserves but, it is important that over the next couple of years we should aim to "balance the budget" through increased fundraising.

Finally, do remember that we have a couple of wheelchairs. If you would like to take someone with mobility problems out for a stroll, or if you need one to take them to an appointment, please just ask.
